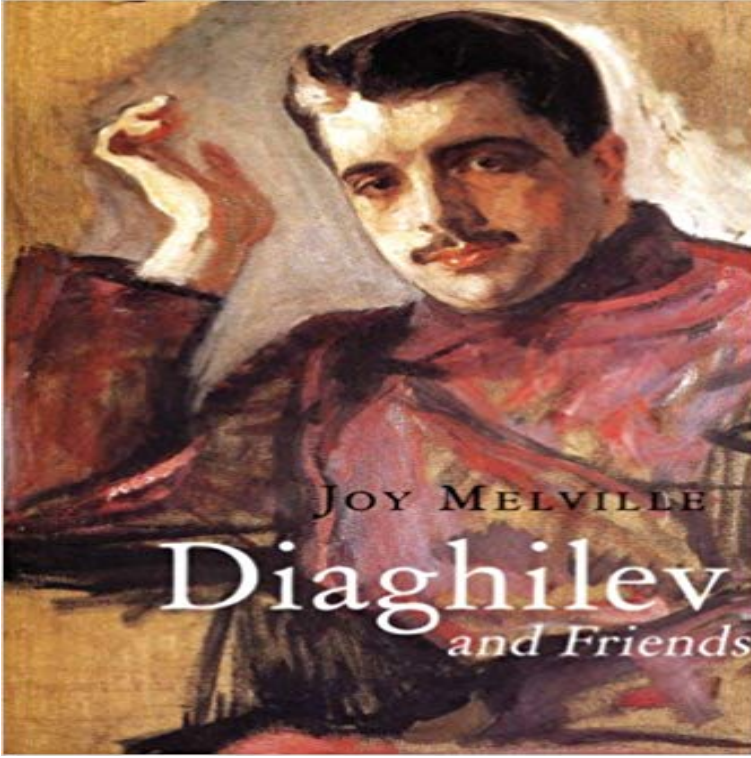


Diaghilev: and his Friends
